It was followed by refreshments, show and tell and the plant raffle.



ORCHIDS IN THE WILD Kathy Ethridge, Conservation Rep



Disa uniflora, the Red Disa, Pride of Table Mountain, is a terrestrial species found in South Africa. This orchid grows near waterfalls, stream beds, and seeps high in the mountains.

Disas have grass like leaves with flowers that grow approximately 4 inches or even larger in length. Colors range from red, white, yellow, orange, pink, to lavender and rare blue. The sepals are the largest and showlest part of the flower, and the dorsal sepal is often marked with some sort of pattern consisting of spotting or striping. In nature, the Disa is dependent on the Mountain Pride Butterfly for pollination. This orchid has become domesticated and has even been found growing in gardens and used like we would use begonias. These orchids are considered tropical, so must be protected from our winters. Disa uniflora sounds like an orchid that I would like to try.



Bryon started growing everything orchid wise under fluorescent lights and in a window, soon realizing that Vanda's don't work well under lights. This is when he came to the conclusion that miniature species did well under lights, and you could purchase so many more to fit the same area. He now grows in a greenhouse with Max Thompson at Southwestern College in Winfield, KS. Poinsettia's, bedding plants, and orchids are their main crops to pay the bills at the greenhouse.
